## Safety First

One role of the US government is to keep its citizens safe. One way the government can do so is by investigating threats and tracking communications that might reveal terrorist activity. The National Security Agency claims it only listens to calls between the United States and other countries. It also only listens to conversations where one person is associated with a terrorist group.

Wiretapping can also help law enforcement catch criminals. Getting warrants to listen in on conversations is difficult. With fewer restrictions, law enforcement could perform their jobs even better and help fight illegal activities like drug trafficking.

# **Identify Evidence**

A strong argument supports a claim with **evidence** such as facts, statistics, quotations, and examples. Evidence that supports a claim is:

- Factual. The information in the evidence should be provably true.
- Relevant. The evidence should relate directly to the claim.
- Meaningful. The evidence should make the claim stronger.
